## **GO** DEEPER

This week, read the Scriptures from Sunday and answer these questions:

- 1. What did you learn from Sunday's sermon? Did you gain new insights?
- 2. Why do you think Christians today are often reluctant to handle disputes within the church, as Paul instructs in 1 Corinthians 6? What are some fears or assumptions that might keep believers from bringing a matter before spiritual leaders?
- 3. Paul says it's better to be wronged than to take a fellow believer to court. How does that challenge our natural desire for fairness or justice? Have you ever had to choose between being right and preserving unity? What happened?
- 4. What does it say about God's view of the church that He considers even the "lowliest" believer more qualified to judge spiritual matters than the world's most educated experts? How can this truth influence the way you view your own spiritual maturity and responsibility?
- 5. Paul reminds the Corinthians that they "used to be" like the unrighteous, but were washed, sanctified, and justified. Why is it important to remember where we've come from in our walk with Christ? In what ways have you seen transformation in your life since coming to know Jesus?
- 6. Oswald Chambers said God may call us to be "doormats" for the sake of Christ. How do you respond to that idea emotionally and spiritually? Can you think of a time when humility in conflict became a powerful witness to someone?
- 7. What step could you take this week to pursue peace with someone you're in conflict with, or to encourage someone else to handle a dispute biblically? How can your small group help support each other in resolving issues like these in Christ-honoring ways?
